



IN PENNSYLVANIA, THE TEACHERS AND FIRST RESPONDERS BACK TO WORK ACT WILL PROVIDE NEARLY \$1.2 BILLION IN FUNDS TO SUPPORT UP TO 14,400 EDUCATOR JOBS

The Teachers and First Responders Back to Work Act will save or create nearly 400,000 education jobs through critical investments in the education of our nation's children. Specifically, The Teachers and First Responders Back to Work Act will invest \$30 billion to support state and local efforts to retain, rehire, and hire early childhood, elementary, and secondary educators. Facing a \$2 billion projected budget shortfall in 2013, cuts to state and local spending on education will place thousands of Pennsylvania teacher jobs at risk. The Teachers and First Responders Back to Work Act will provide Pennsylvania with nearly \$1.2 billion in additional funds that will support 14,400 education jobs, provide a jolt to the state economy, and improve the quality of education. By asking millionaires to pay their fair share, The Teachers and First Responders Back to Work Act will grow the Pennsylvania economy without adding a dime to the deficit.

In Pennsylvania, Education Cuts Result in Teacher Layoffs And Jeopardize Thousands of Jobs.

As a result of the most severe fiscal crisis since the Great Depression, Pennsylvania faced a budget shortfall of \$3.7 billion in 2012, a staggering 13.4% of the state's General Fund. Given Pennsylvania's budget cuts, local school districts could be forced to cut back on educational programs and services, often laying-off needed teachers and other critical staff, or raising additional revenue to cover the shortfall.
