



REPUBLICANS' RECKLESS SPENDING PLAN WOULD COST CALIFORNIA JOBS AND MAKE CALIFORNIA COMMUNITIES LESS SAFE

There is no disagreement that we need to cut spending. We believe that we need to do it in a responsible way so that we live within our means and can invest in the future, out-building, out-educating, and out-innovating our competitors in the world economy. But as the economy continues to recover from the deepest recession in a generation, we cannot afford to make dramatic and indiscriminate cuts that would undermine California jobs and public safety. The reckless Republican spending plan would do just that - an estimated 74,800 California jobs would be lost if H.R. 1 is enacted into law, and thousands of California families would be less safe.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WOULD DESTROY CALIFORNIA JOBS

- Independent, non-partisan analysis has found that H.R. 1 will cut 700,000 jobs through 2012, with California set to lose nearly 75,000 jobs.
- Nearly 28,000 community health center jobs will be eliminated in California if the House-passed bill is enacted.
- A \$16 million grant for the Post of Los Angeles: West Basin Railyard, creating jobs and boosting the local economy, would be eliminated, as would a \$10.2 million grant for the East Bay Pedestrian and Bicycle Network and \$10 million to expand San Bernardino Airport Access.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WOULD HURT EDUCATION IN CALIFORNIA, MAKE CALIFORNIA'S WORKFORCE LESS COMPETITIVE

- Under H.R.1, the average California undergraduate with Pell college tuition assistance will see their assistance cut by \$675.
- More than 24,000 California children will lose access to Head Start, an early education program that is proven to help students complete high school.
- California could lose upwards of \$460 million in job training investments under H.R.1, which would impact approximately 241,000 potential Californian workers.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WILL MAKE CALIFORNIA LESS SAFE

- H.R. 1 reduces Byrne Justice Grants for California by \$16 million.
- H.R. 1 reduces California's homeland security investments by nearly \$13 million, hurting local law enforcement's ability to keep Californians safe.
- Los Angeles and San Francisco could lose more than \$19 million in Transit Security Grants under H.R. 1.
- Los Angeles-Long Beach could lose \$21 million in Port Security Grants under H.R. 1, while San Francisco Bay could lose more than \$13 million.
