



REPUBLICANS' RECKLESS SPENDING PLAN WOULD COST NEW HAMPSHIRE JOBS AND MAKE NEW HAMPSHIRE COMMUNITIES LESS SAFE

There is no disagreement that we need to cut spending. We believe that we need to do it in a responsible way so that we live within our means and can invest in the future, out-building, out-educating, and out-innovating our competitors in the world economy. But as the economy continues to recover from the deepest recession in a generation, we cannot afford to make dramatic and indiscriminate cuts that would undermine New Hampshire jobs and public safety. The reckless Republican spending plan would do just that - an estimated 3,400 New Hampshire jobs would be lost if H.R. 1 is enacted into law, and thousands of New Hampshire families would be less safe.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WOULD DESTROY NEW HAMPSHIRE JOBS

- Independent, non-partisan analysis has found that H.R. 1 will cut 700,000 jobs through 2012, with New Hampshire set to lose more than 3,400 jobs.
- More than 750 community health center jobs will be eliminated in New Hampshire if the House-passed bill is enacted.
- A \$20 million federal transportation grant to help replace the Memorial Bridge connecting Portsmouth, NH, to Kittery, ME, creating jobs and boosting the local economy, would be eliminated.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WOULD HURT EDUCATION IN NEW HAMPSHIRE, MAKE NEW HAMPSHIRE'S WORKFORCE LESS COMPETITIVE

- Under H.R.1, the average New Hampshire undergraduate with Pell college tuition assistance will see their assistance cut by more than \$650.
- More than 400 New Hampshire children will lose access to Head Start, an early education program that is proven to help students complete high school.
- New Hampshire could lose more than \$7.6 million in job training investments under H.R.1, which would impact approximately 3,000 potential New Hampshire workers.

REPUBLICAN SPENDING PLAN WILL MAKE NEW HAMPSHIRE LESS SAFE

- H.R. 1 reduces Byrne Justice Grants for New Hampshire by \$700,000.
- H.R. 1 reduces New Hampshire's homeland security investments by nearly \$800,000, hurting local law enforcement's ability to keep New Hampshire families safe.
- The Portsmouth area could lose more than \$430,000 in Port Security Grants under H.R. 1.
